Navigating hepatitis B care to prevent liver cancer

You Might Have Chronic Hep B and Not Know It

- Hepatitis B Virus (HBV) can cause liver disease, liver cancer, and death
- A common form of transmission is mother to child through birth
- Most of those chronically infected don't know it and don't have symptoms

Hepatitis B is most common in the Asian and Pacific Islander populations.

1 in 12 Asian and Asian American Adults have chronic Hep B

Protect Yourself! Get Screened!

It's Easy

• Ask for a hepatitis B test.

• The test requires a blood sample.

A Guide To Your Results

HBsAg positive (or reactive) = chronic infection by HBV
HBsAb positive (or reactive) = protection from HBV

Example 1	HBsAg	HBsAb
Positive/Reactive		✓
Negative/Nonreactive	√	

Result: You **DO NOT** have HBV and you **ARE** protected against HBV

Action: No vaccination needed but educate others

Example 2	HBsAg	HBsAb
Positive/Reactive		
Negative/Nonreactive	√	√

Result: You DO NOT have HBV and you ARE NOT protected against HBV

Action: Get Hep B Vaccine Now

Example 3	HBsAg	HBsAb
Positive/Reactive	√	
Negative/Nonreactive		√

Result: You **have** HBV infection and **ARE** at risk for liver cancer and cirrhosis.

Action: Find a doctor to take care of and monitor your liver health

What To Do If You Are Infected

If you test postive for chronic hepatitis B infection, get linked to care.

Seek Hepatitis B Care

 Ask your doctor whether you need to be on medication to prevent liver damage and liver cancer. Ask if you need to see a specialist.

Monitor Your Liver Health

- Get blood tests to check for liver damage and liver cancer twice a year.
- Get a liver ultrasound to monitor for liver cancer every 6-12 months or as recommended by your doctor.

Stay Informed and Educate Others

 Getting family and friends educated and tested may save their lives.



Don't be a statistic, you can save yourself, your family and your friends. Help end hepatitis B.
